# LOCAL DWI GRANT PROGRAM STATEWIDE EVALUATION

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Paul Guerin, Ph. D Principal Investigator The Institute for Social Research recently submitted two reports to the Local Government Division (LGD) of the Department of Finance and Administration (DFA), the Evaluation Plan Reviews and the Proposed Performance Measures. Both of these reports placed emphasis on the need for counties to adopt standardized performance measures as well as implement a standardized format for the evaluation plans. As emphasized in both reports, statewide adoption of performance measures would not only allow for counties to better evaluate the effectiveness of their program, but it would also affect the evaluation plans which serve as the tool for evaluating each program. In addition to these recommendations, we are further recommending the implementation of a county level information system that directly relates to the performance measures that were originally proposed in these reports. The primary reasons for considering the standardization of data collection at the county level are; program monitoring and measuring performance. With a database system in place, common measures could be aggregated and progress could be monitored against standardized benchmarks. Also, with the same data being collected, comparisons could be made across counties. In short, the database should be considered a data collection tool as well as a reporting system that is able to track the performance of each program.

To understand the importance of a centralized database, it should be clear that performance measures provide a minimum baseline set of measures that each county is required to report and as stated in previous reports, "the adoption of both a client and program level minimum dataset would help contribute to the successful implementation of performance measures because it would standardize the information collected in each county". The importance of a database should be considered "a step that will allow not only county level DWI programs, but also the Department of Finance and Administration Local Government Division and the public to better understand the effectiveness of programs designed to reduce DWI." In summary, the implementation of a county level data information system that directly relates to standardized performance measures, would undeniably work to assure that this occurs in each county.

Included in this report is a draft of the proposed county dataset, which lists the required fields and the data sources. The construction of this dataset began with the question of what do counties do at the county level? More important, what are the factors that most affect DWI in each county? The required fields proposed in this report reflect these considerations. Also taken into account was whether or not the data is comparable, whether or not it is available and how often, and how reasonable it would be to obtain it. A client level minimum dataset has already been proposed, adopted, and is being piloted. It will be fully implemented in the next year. This dataset will be used to report information on clients served.

The county data set we are proposing is divided into four sections and includes fifty-three fields. These sections are; 1) County Demographics 2) DWI Planning Council Information 3) County Level Performance Measures for Funded Components 4) Program Level Performance Measures. Below is an explanation of these sections and which required fields would be necessary to collect. At the end of this report is a sample matrix of that provides a list of these fields and the data sources.

## County Demographics

County demographics are important to collect in order to compare county level data across counties. This section requires basic information about the counties, such as total population and population by sex and ethnicity. It further requests information regarding the criminal justice system and its agencies such as number of courts, number of judges, number of sworn law enforcement officers and number of individuals on probation or parole. In regards of the county history or background, information such as political affiliation of population by county and number of liquor establishments are also listed.

#### DWI Planning Council Information

This section of requires basic information from each county regarding their DWI planning Council and programs in general. The data requested includes information on staff members, interns, and the treatment providers, for example, how many staff members and the number of LADACS on staff. Also, the number of contract providers there are per county and the level of licensure for contracted treatment providers. This section also addresses the counties budget and expenditures, as well as the number of funded components per county.

### County Level Performance Measures for Funded Components

At the time we began discussions about the development of a county level dataset and performance measures there were seven components funded by the Local DWI Grant Program. Since then an eighth funded component (Domestic Violence) has been added. The required fields suggested in this section are directly taken from the performance measures listed in the Performance Measures report and encompass the seven original components: Screening, Enforcement, Prevention, Outpatient Treatment, Intensive Supervision/Compliance Monitoring, Alternative Sentencing, and Coordination, Planning and Evaluation.

#### Program Level Performance Measures

The fields included in this section also reflect those suggested in the Performance Measures Report. According to the report, programs in each county should have performance measures that represent the result of the work that is being done. Unlike the measures outlined above, these measures serve to measure overall program effectiveness and are not attributable to any one funded component area. Some of the fields included in this section are number of DWI arrests by year, number of dismissals, rate of alcohol involved mother vehicle crashes by year, ree of alcohol involved motor vehicle crash injuries by year and percent convicted to arrested by county.
