EVALUATION OF THE ALBUQUERQUE TARGET CITIES PROGRAM

Quarterly Report for the period of October 1, 1993 through December 31, 1993

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SECTION ONE INTRODUCTION

Evaluation Background and Format

The Albuquerque Target Cities Project was refunded by the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT) for two years beginning September 30, 1993 through September 1995. As part of the continued funding, CSAT required an evaluation component. The Youth Resource and Analysis Center (YRAC), a division of the Institute for Social Research (ISR), University of New Mexico (UNM) was contracted to perform this evaluation.

The Youth Resource and Analysis Center was also contracted as the local evaluator for the first cycle of Target Cities funding from September 1990 through September 1993. During that time YRAC prepared a final report for the City of Albuquerque that documented project activities, client characteristics, and treatment services. For the current contract period, YRAC has designed a somewhat different, more interactive, evaluation format.

An important component of the current evaluation is ongoing observation of provider agency organizational processes within the context of the Target Cities contract. The evaluation team has been objectively observing each Service Delivery Unit as unobtrusively as possible in order to gain a better understanding of these components. The evaluation team will use information obtained through these efforts to provide agencies with data relevant to their unique service delivery models and organizational goals.

Start-up Activities

The YRAC-Target Cities evaluation contract was signed with the City of Albuquerque on December 3, 1993. During the initial start-up period, YRAC organized staff dedicated to the Target Cities Project evaluation. To conduct a more interactive evaluation, individuals (site managers) were assigned to specific Target City agencies. The main function of the site managers is to facilitate and foster cooperation and interaction between the evaluation team and the Target Cities agencies. Site managers are responsible for accessing the agencies, collecting necessary data (i.e. client characteristics and services

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provided), observing program processes and serving as a liaison between the agency and the evaluators.

The Target Cities evaluation staff also includes data collectors, data entry staff, data analysts and additional support staff. The staff meet weekly to assess current progress and to plan for the following weeks.

Report Objectives

The purpose of this and subsequent reports, which will be produced for the City of Albuquerque and the Target Cities partner agencies monthly, is to provide each agency with relevant feedback. This feedback will include observations of organizational processes and the characteristics of clients seen by each SDU. Future reports will also include treatment services provided to clients, as well as agency referral patterns. Where appropriate, practical, and agreed upon, staff and client interviews will be conducted. The evaluation team hopes that these reports will provide Target Cities agencies with useful information relevant to programmatic decisions and treatment services. The evaluation team welcomes any suggestions or requests regarding the collection or analysis of the data by the providers that may be relevant for either the project, individual agencies or particular SDU's.

SECTION TWO

SUMMARY OF EVALUATION ACTIVITIES FOR EACH TARGET CITIES SDU

As mentioned in Section One, the evaluation team began activities after signing the contract on December 3, 1993. After site managers were assigned to each provider agency, the site managers contacted relevant staff in the majority of the funded SDU's. The evaluation team discussed goals and objectives with the agencies at Partners meetings and at individual agencies. These initial discussions focused on the introduction of personnel, the interactive aspect of the evaluation, the observation of relevant SDUs, and the collection of necessary quantitative data (i.e., organizational level data, backlog/intake/discharge logs, client characteristics, etc.).

During these initial introductions, the team began to design data collection instruments and implement the data collection/entry process. Although the team has accessed all the service provider agencies, the evaluators have not yet received or analyzed all data from every funded SDU for a variety of reasons. These reasons will be reported in the following discussion on a case-by-case basis.

ACTIVITIES WITHIN EACH TARGET CITIES SDU

Albuquerque Health Care for the Homeless (AHCH)

AHCH is composed of numerous programs targeting the homeless population. The programs (SDU's) funded by Target Cities include the Outreach Program, the Substance Abuse Counselor, the Residential Treatment Facility (Casa los Arboles) and the Drug-free Housing (Villa de Paz). Initial contact with AHCH was made at a meeting of the partner provider agencies. The evaluation team requested and received from AHCH relevant organizational level data for the evaluation.

Outreach Program:

The initial contact with the outreach worker, a position only partially funded by Target Cities, was via phone; the first face-to-face meeting took place in mid-December. During this first reporting period, discussion centered around the relevance and use of the Target Cities screening instrument. AHCH staff indicated that the screening form was inappropriate for the homeless population and, as currently structured, might limit the effectiveness of the outreach program. With the approval of the city and the help of CASAA, the evaluation team created an agency-specific screening instrument that collects a minimum amount of information. This instrument is similar to the more extensive Target Cities screening instrument for adults. The evaluators have been able to collect and analyze all client characteristic data from the outreach program for this reporting period.

Substance Abuse Counseling:

The evaluation team's first contact with this SDU was with the former substance abuse counselor. The past several months have been transitional for the substance abuse counselor position at AHCH; there were at least two weeks during this period that the position was vacant. Because of scheduling conflicts, the evaluation staff and the substance abuse counselor had only minimal contact during the period covered by this report. However, the site manager and staff were able to collect and analyze all client characteristic data from the substance abuse counselor for this reporting period.

Drug Free Housing (Villa de Paz):

The site manager's first contact with this SDU was with the house manager in early December. This initial meeting addressed future contacts and questions relevant to the evaluation process. Besides this first meeting, the site manager made no other contact with Villa de Paz during the reporting period. The site manager and staff have collected and analyzed all client characteristic data from the drug-free housing unit for this reporting period.

Residential Treatment Facility (Casa los Arboles):

The site manager's first contact with Casa los Arboles staff was in early December with the Substance Abuse Program Manager at a partners meeting. They scheduled a follow-up meeting for the upcoming week at the treatment facility. During this meeting, the site manager received a tour of the facility and participated in a discussion about relevant historical issues, as well as the operating philosophy of the facility. The Casa los Arboles staff granted access to all relevant files, staff members, and residents. The site manager attended a residential community meeting in the latter part of the month. This meeting provided information regarding the services provided at the facility. The site manager and staff were able to collect and analyze all client characteristic data from Casa los Arboles for this reporting period. In addition, the site manager has discussed the purpose, design and use of an interview guide for residents with AHCH staff.

Center on Alcoholism, Substance Abuse, and Addictions

CASAA, a division of the UNM Mental Health Center, serves as Albuquerque's key publicly funded substance abuse center. It provides a wide range of services to adult and adolescent substance abusers. CASAA contains a large number of programs and components. Programs funded under the Target Cities Project include the Substance Abuse Treatment and Assessment Network (SATAARN), Caseload Reduction, Ambulatory Detoxification, the Childcare Unit, Neighborhood Outreach, the Jail Liaison, and Staff Development. The evaluation team has requested but not yet received from CASAA relevant organizational-level data for the evaluation.

Substance Abuse Assessment Tracking and Referral Network (SAATARN):

The evaluation team has been tracking the progress and implementation of the SAATARN system. This system is designed to electronically network Target Cities provider agencies in order to facilitate interagency treatment referrals. During this reporting period, the CASAA site manager attended one SATAARN system training held in mid-December.

Caseload Reduction:

The evaluation team collected monthly caseload reports for CASAA counselors and staff through December 1993. Findings will be presented in a future report.

Ambulatory Detoxification:

The evaluation team first contacted the Nurse Coordinator of the Ambulatory Detoxification unit in mid-December. Discussion focused on the scope of the evaluation and collection of daily logs that are maintained by the unit. Daily logs through December 1993 have been collected, entered and analyzed. Findings are summarized in Section Three of this report. In addition, the site manager and staff collected and analyzed all client characteristic data from the ambulatory detoxification program for the period of this report. Finally, the evaluation team has discussed with CASAA staff future efforts to interview clients participating in the Ambulatory Detoxification Program.

Child Care Unit:

The on-site Child Care facility at CASAA provides easily accessible child care for parents and/or caregivers undergoing treatment at CASAA. The evaluation team collected basic demographic information on all children served in the child care unit beginning October 1, 1993 through December 1993. Data-entry staff have matched these children to the appropriate parent(s)/caregiver(s) that received services at CASAA while the children were in the child care unit. Client characteristic data for parents and caregivers were collected and analyzed. Finally, the evaluation team and CASAA staff discussed future efforts to interview adults using the child care facility about their experiences and satisfaction with the service.

Neighborhood Outreach:

The evaluation team has collected, but not analyzed, client characteristics for all clients served by the two outreach workers through December 1993. The evaluation team will primarily be gathering relevant data from existing hard copy forms that are utilized by the outreach staff. The analysis of these data will be presented in a future report.

Jail Liaison:

The evaluation of this program will begin in February 1994, which is when their contract period begins.

Staff Development:

The Staff Development Program assists staff from the various Target Cities agencies (as well as other agencies) by providing workshops and training sessions. The Staff Development program was designed in an effort to increase the quality of patient care while reducing staff turnover. The evaluation team first met with the Staff Development Director in mid-December. During this meeting the scope of the evaluation was discussed.

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The evaluation team spent the initial evaluation period devising a system of data collection in collaboration with Milagro staff. The site manager and staff documented, collected, and analyzed client characteristic data for program residents from October 1, 1993 through December 1993. The evaluation team has also collected demographic characteristics of the children of the program residents. The site manager and Milagro staff have begun discussing the design and implementation of client satisfaction interviews. The evaluation team has requested but not yet received relevant organizational level data from Milagro.

Relevancy

Relevancy is a new program that will address the needs of African American and other minority substance abusers. The program, whose office is located in the South Broadway area, will provide outpatient counseling and treatment services. One goal of the agency will be to provide interim treatment while clients are awaiting inpatient services at other agencies. The program will employ one staff psychologist, one substance abuse counselor, and at least two other support positions. The evaluation of Relevancy officially begins February 1, 1994 when Relevancy signs their contract and starts providing services. Members of the evaluation team have had some preliminary contacts with Relevancy staff in regards to the evaluation.

Youth Development Incorporated (YDI)

YDI is a program that seeks to provide comprehensive services to meet the needs of youth and their families. The program, whose main office is on the west side of Albuquerque, supports more than twenty projects whose services range from gang intervention to runaway group homes. Two of these internal projects are funded by Target Cities. The first is an outreach program which is designed to identify and refer substance abusing youth to appropriate agencies. The other is a substance abuse counseling program which provides counseling, substance abuse education, and other services. The evaluation team has requested and received from YDI relevant organizational level data for the evaluation.

YDI Outreach Program:

The evaluation team's initial contact with the YDI Outreach Program occurred at a scheduled meeting of the partners. The site manager and the outreach program staff conducted a follow-up meeting which addressed the overall evaluation project and focused on the specific objectives relevant to YDI. The evaluation team has collected and analyzed client characteristic data for all outreach clients seen beginning October 1, 1993 through December 1993.

Substance Abuse Counseling:

The evaluation team experienced some difficulty finding a mutually agreeable time for a meeting with the Target Cities funded substance abuse counselor. A meeting was scheduled and held in early December. During this meeting necessary evaluation activities were discussed. The substance abuse counselor expressed some concern that evaluation activities might interfere with the provision of services to the clients. The site manager stressed to the staff that the evaluation team would do everything possible to accommodate these concerns and would seek mutually acceptable meeting times. The evaluators have collected and analyzed all client characteristics for all outreach clients seen beginning October 1, 1993 through December 1993.



Overall, these data suggest that number of client contacts per month remained consistent between October and December 1993. The amount of missing data decreased over time for some variables (e.g., status and age) and remained constant for other variables (e.g., living environment, drug of choice, and ethnicity).

Case Management Collaborative

The Case Management Collaborative provides case management services to children and adolescents with serious neurobiological disorders, emotional disturbances, as well as substance abuse disorders. The site manager made initial contact with the director of the Case Management Collaborative during a scheduled meeting of the partner provider agencies. A later meeting was held where the Case Management Collaborative staff and the evaluation staff discussed collection of client characteristic data. The evaluation team requested and received from the Case Management Collaborative Director relevant organizational level data for the evaluation. The team has also collected and analyzed the demographic data for clients receiving services from the different case managers for the period of this report.

Hogares

Hogares is a private non-profit agency whose purpose is to work with troubled adolescents ages 13-18 and their families. There are seven distinct programs offered by Hogares: Outpatient Counseling, Day Treatment, Foster Care, Therapeutic Group Homes, Residential Treatment Centers for youngsters with severe emotional problems, Residential Treatment Centers for substance abusers, and Independent Living. Only those programs relevant to substance abuse are included in this evaluation.

The site manager initially contacted Hogares staff at a regularly scheduled meeting of the partner provider agencies. During a subsequent meeting at Hogares, participants from both the evaluation team and Hogares agreed that Hogares staff would collect client characteristics data for the evaluation team with the understanding that the evaluation team staff would be able to verify the information. A Hogares liaison was appointed to facilitate efforts of the evaluation team. Finally, the evaluation team requested and received from Hogares relevant organizational-level data for the evaluation.

Hogares Case Management:

The evaluation team has collected and analyzed all client characteristic data for the Target Cities funded case managers through December 31, 1993.

Hogares Aftercare Therapy:

The evaluation team has collected and analyzed all client characteristics for the Target Cities funded aftercare therapist through December 31, 1993.

Hogares Treatment Therapy:

To date the evaluation team has been able to collect client characteristic data from the 1 FTE treatment therapist funded by Target Cities through December 1993. The team has not been able to collect any data for the other .5 FTE Target Cities-funded staff member. It is the evaluation team's understanding that this position has been vacant, but it is not clear if the position has been vacant for the complete reporting period.

Hogares Outreach Program:

The evaluation team experienced some difficulties accessing and then collecting client characteristic data from this program. These difficulties have been overcome and this data will be analyzed in a later report.

Bernalillo County Juvenile Detention Center (JDC)

To date, JDC has not hired staff for the Target Cities-funded substance abuse program. They have however, placed ads in the paper for December 12 and 19, 1993. They hope to hire, train, and begin services in early February 1994. The evaluators have been continuously in contact with JDC and have been kept informed of their progress.

Milagro Residential Program

The Milagro program provides inpatient and outpatient treatment and perinatal services to pregnant and postpartum women. The Milagro residential program is housed in a homelike facility on the campus of Carrie Tingley Children's Hospital. The residential program also extends services to children of the women in the program.
